...for helping MK control COVID-19

A huge thank you to everyone in Milton Keynes for following hands, face, space and all other COVID-19 precautions to reduce the spread of the virus locally.

Testing and vaccinations play a big part in controlling COVID-19.

- Around one in three people who are infected with COVID-19 have no symptoms and could be spreading the disease without knowing it. Regular testing is important to help find more of these cases, so people can isolate and break the chain of transmission.

- COVID-19 vaccines provide really good levels of protection. As well as reducing cases, if vaccinated people catch the virus they are less likely to be seriously ill or die. Please come forward for vaccination when it's your turn and tell your family and friends how important it is to be vaccinated.

### **How do I get my vaccination?**

All adults in the UK should be offered their first dose by the end of July. When your age group is called, you'll receive a text from the national booking service inviting you to make an appointment at a vaccination centre. Pictured is the team at the Saxon Court vaccination centre in Central MK.

You may also receive an invitation from your GP. These don't cancel each other out. Please choose which is most convenient for you and book either through your GP or the national booking system by visiting [nhs.uk/covid-vaccination](https://nhs.uk/covid-vaccination) or ringing 119.

### **How do I get tested?**

We're offering free rapid COVID-19 tests to anyone over the age of 16 at Central MK Library on Silbury Boulevard. No need to book, show ID or register - just ask a member of staff.

You can also visit our Central MK Library for a free on-site test. No need to book. Results will be sent to you within around 45 minutes. The test centre is open weekdays from 9.30am to 4.30pm and stays open later on Thursdays until 7pm.

#### **Police & Crime Commissioner Result**

Conservative candidate Matthew Barber has been elected as the next Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for the Thames Valley.

Mr Barber won 313,148 of the votes cast (267,404 first choice and 45,744 second preference) and was elected on the second preference poll after no candidates received more than 50 per cent of the first votes.

Labour candidate Laetisia Carter finished second with 233,446 votes (175,123 first and 58,323 second).

### **Wavendon**

For people living in Wavendon, the hourly services from Woburn Sands are as much as two miles away, and the station itself has limited facilities and no parking. Under both of our service concepts, people using the station would have access to more services to more places with shorter journey times, with four new, faster services to Bletchley, Bedford and beyond – including direct trains to Cambridge (53 minutes) and Oxford (40 minutes). The difference between service concepts 1 and 2 is that service concept 2 would remove the hourly service, which would make the whole line more reliable for passengers. It would also mean relocating Woburn Sands 350m to the west, giving passengers better facilities and improved parking, pedestrian routes and cycle links.

### **Woburn Sands**

People living in Woburn Sands currently have hourly services from a station with limited facilities and no parking. Under both of our service concepts, people using the station would have access to more services to more places with shorter journey times, with four new, faster services to Bletchley, Bedford and beyond – including direct trains to Cambridge (53 minutes) and Oxford (40 minutes). The difference between service concepts 1 and 2 is that service concept 2 would remove the hourly service, which would make the whole line more reliable for passengers. It would also mean relocating Woburn Sands 350m to the west, giving passengers better facilities and improved parking, pedestrian routes and cycle links.

At the time of writing (27/3), organisers have raised just over £2,300.

### Caldecotte Car Park (Tilbrook / Red Bull)

#### From Director Environment & Property (MKC)

We have also followed up with Red Bull and met Terry Brice regarding charging at their Tilbrook car park. We discussed Red Bull's position and we all agreed it was not the intent to charge at the outset of the project, nor during the course of completing the deal to enable the project to undertaken. Red Bull did however have a significant unbudgeted cost increases to complete and manage the car park, including having fixed opening times and wider infrastructure requirements. This is the root cause of why they needed to consider and implement charging.

There are no contractual requirements for Red Bull not to charge here, either through the agreement to dispose of the land to them or through planning. We left it with Terry that we would continue to liaise with him on this, particularly as the East West Rail position is something for us all to work through. There may be an opportunity for this car park to support the wider parking issues at the Caldecotte Business Park on a commercial basis but that is something for Terry and Red Bull to consider firstly if it's appropriate for them.



**Train services have resumed on the Marston Vale line, initially at peak times (three journeys each way in the morning and three in the evening) supplemented by a Rail Replacement Bus Service during the rest of the day.**

The timetable has been adjusted to accommodate the start and finish times of Kimberley College, the single largest user of the Line. Please find attached.

As you may be aware, the East West Rail Company launched a non-statutory consultation last week, which runs until 9th June. This covers customer experience, railway operations and a range of infrastructure proposals.

Two concepts are proposed for the Marston Vale Line:

- **Concept 1:** The existing hourly stopping service would continue to serve all Marston Vale Line stations, with a new limited-stop EWR service calling at two stations – Woburn Sands and Ridgmont – four times an hour.
- **Concept 2:** There would be five new merged stations on the Marston Vale Line – all five would benefit from at least two EWR services every hour, and some would have four.

The Line Guide will form the basis of the new Days Out section on the MVCRP website. The launch date for the Line Guide was Friday 30th April.

The doors open on 18 May, why not step inside and see what’s in it for you?



### **Greensand Country commissions 'A Children's Story'**

Children and parents within Greensand Country are set to benefit from three bespoke theatre productions by 'A Children's Story.'

The three new shows created for children, young people and families are part of the 'Celebrating Greensand Country' programme. The roles are performed by local professional actors and the

costume, make-up and script have been developed with insight from work from Greensand Country Landscape Partnership Volunteers.

Each show takes a unique look at the local area and tells its very own story.

The first in the series is 'The Reversing Mystery Clock Watch'. This is an exciting, storytelling adventure which takes us to Northill Village and Ickwell Green, Woburn Abbey and Gardens, Shuttleworth Collection and Moggerhanger Park. Join Clockmaker, Thomas Tompion, as he tries to solve this horological mystery with the help of other famous figures from Greensand Country – Mary Russell & Humphry Repton. This production is suitable for all ages and is available from 8th May at 10 am.

The second story follows Pidge, a young pigeon from Leighton Buzzard who is exploring the countryside for the first time. Pidge finds clues, objects and other wildlife which leads him to Owly, a wise old owl who lives at the Tree of Life at The Lodge Nature Reserve in Sandy (home to the RSPB). The two share experiences, memories and stories about exploring the outdoors, their love for the countryside and the bright, positive outcomes it offers.

'Pidge's Big Adventure' is an interactive, adventure trail film, in which we explore wildlife, especially birds and bugs, found within Greensand Country. The story will encourage a love and understanding of British wildlife found around Rushmere Country Park, Maulden Woods and RSPB, The Lodge Nature Reserve in Sandy. This piece is specifically designed for children aged 0-4 years / Pre-School, this is available from 10am on Saturday 16th May.

The final story is The Ridge Ranger on his new television show which sets out to discover all about Greensand Country and The Greensand Ridge. Think "Blue Peter" meets "The One Show" and you'll know what this programme is about! The Ridge Ranger, our enthusiastic presenter, encourages our audience to take an active interest in Greensand Country and helps us learn how to preserve it.

Join us for a mix of topics, segments and interviews with volunteers and specialists – including the Head Ranger at Amptill Great Park, a Youth Ranger from The Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs & Northants and a special volunteer. We also share a few Walking Wonders from our favourite walks. The piece is specifically designed for families and children aged 4 – 11, this is available from 10am Saturday 22nd May.

All three events are free and are part of the Greensand Country Festival, supported by Mulberry Homes. The first story will launch on Saturday 8th May at 10am and be available for download throughout May.

## Latest news from your council



### **More children starting at a preferred school in 2021**

Thousands of MK children found out in April which primary school they'll be starting in September. A record number of children (99%) were offered a place at one of their preferred schools whilst (93%) have secured a place at their first preference school.

Milton Keynes Council received 3,350 applications by the 15 January deadline. This year, 26 children did not get allocated a preferred choice, compared to 46 children in 2020.

Of the applications received on time, the majority (93.2%) received their first preference school – an increase of 2% from last year. 4.3% of children received their second preference, 1.5% received their third preference school and 0.2% were allocated their fourth preference school.

Today is also offer day for more than 1,000 children due to transfer from infant to junior school. Most families (97%) have been allocated their first preference and 99% have been allocated one of their four preferences.

The council continues to work with schools to reduce capacity where places are no longer needed and increase provision where there is growing demand.

A small number of late applications have been received. Where applications are received late, between 16 January 2021 and 30 April 2021, school place offers will be sent on 28 May 2021 by letter.

Parents who still need to make an application should complete a late application form which is available on the council's website

### **Quarterly Housing Monitoring**

In Quarter 4 there were 742 completions (120 affordable) in the borough of Milton Keynes and 504 starts (136 affordable) with 3 losses from stock. The stock of dwellings in Milton Keynes stands at 117,662: 100,420 in the city and 17,242 in the rural area. At the 1st January 2021 we had 13,053

planning permissions (8,936 full permissions and 5,842 outline), and a further 13,053 potential units on existing Local Plan sites – 27,831 dwellings in all.
